Oasis Pipeline Fire Recovery Workshop April 18, 2015 <u>Details</u> <u>Register On-line</u> Following the Oasis Pipeline Wildfire in April of 2011, the South Llano Watershed Alliance, in conjunction with other agencies and private partners, hosted the 2011 Oasis Pipeline Wildfire Recovery & Reclamation Workshop. Participants in the workshop toured lands impacted by the wildfire and learned some suggested practices on how to help restore these lands.
