Several board positions are on the ballot in both Bandera and Hays Counties for the local groundwater conservation districts.

"The Alliance has brought together ranchers, county commissioners, businesspeople, and a wide array of Hill Country residents to become better aware of the challenges facing the area in protecting its natural resources," said Muse. "We work with all stakeholders across the region to help protect these wonderful aspects of our part of the state."

"We urge residents of the Hill Country to take advantage of the information available regarding water issues here in our area, and encourage area residents to be sure to vote in their groundwater district elections May 14th," said Muse.
