



The county resolution supports voluntary efforts to reduce light pollution by encouraging the use of outdoor lighting fixtures and practices for cost-effective and nonintrusive lighting. The resolution states that the county will "work with its partners to educate and encourage landowners, businesses, residential communities and public entities to join in this commitment to reduce energy consumption, save money and reduce light trespass." This endeavor is intended to "protect the beauty of the night skies and allow others the full benefit and use of their private property." As Judge Murr stated, the night sky is part of the region's scenic beauty that brings significant economic and financial benefits to the community. Voluntary efforts to reduce light pollution should therefore be encouraged for the benefit of both residents and visitors.


