**State Representative Andy Murr.** Elected to the Texas House of Representatives 2014, Andrew Murr's district includes much of the Hill Country region including Bandera, Crockett, Edwards, Kerr, Kimble, Llano, Mason, Medina, Menard, Real, Schleicher and Sutton Counties. An eighth generation Texan, he was raised on a ranch in Kimble County, and attended school in Junction. He attended Texas A&M University, receiving a bachelor degree, summa cum laude, in Agricultural Development with an emphasis in economics and policy. He subsequently graduated with highest honors from Texas Tech University School of Law. In 2008, Representative Murr was elected Kimble County Attorney. However, he was appointed to the position of County Judge, due to a vacancy, before he was sworn in. He is a past president of the Kimble-Edwards Farm Bureau Board of Directors and Junction Rotary Club. He serves as a member of the Kimble County of Historical Commission and the Kimble County Youth Show. He is also a proud member of the State Bar of Texas, Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association, the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, and the National Rifle Association.



**Roel Lopez**, *Director of Texas A&M Institute of Renewable Natural Resources*. Dr. Roel Lopez is Director of the Texas A&M Institute of Renewable Natural Resources and Professor in the Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences at Texas A&M University. He has over 20 years of experience in natural resource and land management with academia, federal and private industry. As a researcher and teacher, he has authored >100 journal articles and book chapters and has chaired over 60 graduate students. He served as Special Assistant to the Deputy Under Secretary of Defense-Installation and Environment and continues to work with the Department of Defense on various national and regional natural resource and environmental issues. His research focuses on endangered and fragmented wildlife populations, wildlife populations in urban settings, and sustainability of military lands.



**Robert Mace**, *Deputy Executive Administrator for Water Science and Conservation, Texas Water Development Board*. Dr. Robert E. Mace joined the Texas Water Development Board in 1999 to manage the Groundwater Availability Modeling Program. Since then, he has served as a unit leader and director for the Groundwater Resources Division and currently serves as the Deputy Executive Administrator for Water Science & Conservation, a department of 64 scientists, engineers, and specialists dedicated to better understanding groundwater and surface water resources in Texas and advancing water conservation and innovative water technologies such as desalination, aquifer storage and recovery, reuse, and rainwater harvesting. Prior to joining the Texas Water Development Board, Robert worked for almost nine years at the Bureau of Economic Geology at The University of Texas at Austin as a hydrologist and research scientist. Robert has a B.S. in Geophysics and an M.S. in Hydrology from the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology and a Ph.D. in Hydrogeology from The University of Texas at Austin. His residential consumption of water is less than 30 gallons per person per day (and would be lower if his wife was more cooperative).



**Ken Kattner,** *Landowner, Putman Mountain Observatory.* Ken Kattner is a business attorney by day and an amateur astronomer by night. From his Putman Mountain Observatory located in the Texas Hill Country, he looks deep into the universe recording images of far-away supernova and galaxies. Gaining insight from spending time under the dark, pristine skies of the Hill Country, Ken has learned that preserving the beauty of our night skies is a significant natural resource important to each of us. That insight has led Ken to help a number of Hill Country cities design and implement lighting codes to promote more efficient, dark sky friendly outdoor lighting. Recently he assisted Enchanted Rock State Natural Area obtain a gold tier designation as a Dark Sky Park by the International Dark Sky Association. Ken is now working with a number of cities, businesses, individuals, and the Hill Country Alliance in order to establish a Hill Country Dark Sky Reserve.



**Patrick Bixler**, *Research Scientist*, *Texas A&M Institute for Renewable Natural Resources*. Patrick, a native Texan and new resident of the Hill Country, focuses his work on the intersection of ecology, economy and governance and is particularly interested in the role of relationships and networks that link local actions to landscape-level outcomes. He is a Research Scientist for Conservation Policy at Texas A&M Institute for Renewable Natural Resources where he contributes a human dimensions perspective to the Institute's work. Patrick received his PhD from Colorado State University and completed a post-doctoral fellowship at the Pinchot Institute for Conservation in Washington, D.C.



**Con Mims,** Executive Director of the Nueces River Authority. Con is a graduate of Texas A&M University, Class of 1965, and has worked for nearly 50 years in the fields of water resource protection, planning, and development. He began his career with the San Antonio River Authority in 1966 and joined the Nueces River Authority in 1976. He was appointed Executive Director in 1978. The Authority has offices in Uvalde and Corpus Christi. Con currently serves as the Chairman of the South Central Texas Regional Water Planning Group (Region L) and Chairman of the Texas Instream Flows Program, Nueces River and Corpus Christi Bay and Baffin Bay Area. He was former Chair of the Edwards aquifer Recovery Implementation Program Steering Committee and Past President of the Texas Water Conservation Association. He is active in leadership roles in numerous organizations including Director, Texas Wildlife Association.



Joe Lessard, Consultant to the Lone Star Rail Project. Mr. Joseph L. Lessard is Senior Planning Director for Knudson LP, a firm specializing in urban planning, landscape architecture, public participation, economic development and construction management consultancy. Joe specializes in providing intergovernmental relations/outreach, economic development, strategic project management and organizational alignment services. Previously he was head of Land Development Services for Kucera Management and prior to that he was Assistant City Manager with the City of Austin. Joe held oversight responsibilities at one time or another for sixteen of the City's department or functional areas. He holds Bachelor of Arts degrees in business administration and political science from Washington State University and a Master of Public Affairs degree from the Indiana University School of Public and Environmental Affairs. Mr. Lessard is a member of the International City Management Association, the Urban Land Institute and the Congress for the New Urbanism. He previously served on the Envision Central Texas Board of Directors and on the Citizen Advisory Committee for the Balcones Canyonland Conservation Plan.



**Special Keynote Speaker: Bob Yaro,** *Potter Rose Visting Professor, UT School of Architecture Professor of Practice in City and Regional Planning at the University of Pennsylvania, President Emeritus and Senior Advisor at Regional Plan Association in New York.* For more than 40 years Yaro has been a thought leader in urban, transportation and environmental planning, in both the US and around the world. Until his retirement as RPA's President and CEO in December, 2014, he led the Association's research and advocacy efforts for more than a quarter century. Before coming to RPA in 1989 he served as a planner and public sector executive for the City of Boston and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, where he led urban park and land conservation programs, including creation of the Boston Harbor Islands, Lowell and Blackstone Valley state and national parks. Bob has also taught planning at the graduate level since 1984, at Penn, Harvard, Columbia and the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. At UMass he established and led the Center for Rural Massachusetts, where he initiated the nation's first smart growth program, Growing Smart in Massachusetts. He has also led efforts in New York and New England to manage growth and preserve natural resource systems for several large landscapes containing important ecological, scenic and water resources. Bob lives with his wife, Susan in Guilford, CT.
