Texas Water Symposium at Schreiner April 12: A Close Look at Hydraulic Fracturing or "Fracking"

Austin, TX (April 4, 2012) – The next Texas Water Symposium will be at 7 p.m., Thursday, April 12, in the Floyd & Kathleen Cailloux Campus Activity Center on the Schreiner University campus.

If nothing else, the record 2011 drought has underlined the importance of water and water use issues for Texas. The Texas Water Symposium, co-sponsored by Schreiner University, Texas Tech University, Texas Public Radio and the Hill Country Alliance, has been addressing these issues for five years now through panels of experts and community involvement.

The topic for the April symposium will be "Fracking and the Energy/Water Nexus: A look at every aspect and every question surrounding this timely issue." Fracking—or hydraulic fracturing—is a way of releasing oil and natural gas by using a highly pressurized liquid to fracture surrounding rock layers. Fracking creates new channels in the rock, making the extraction of fossil fuels easier. Questions exist about the effects of this process on our water supply.

The panelists for this symposium will include Cyrus Reed, conservation director of the Lone Star Chapter of The Sierra Club in Austin; Leslie Savage, chief geologist for the Railroad Commission of Texas Oil and Gas Division; and Ken Rainwater, director of the Water Resources Center at Texas Tech University-Lubbock. Dr. Tim Summerlin, president of Schreiner University will moderate.
