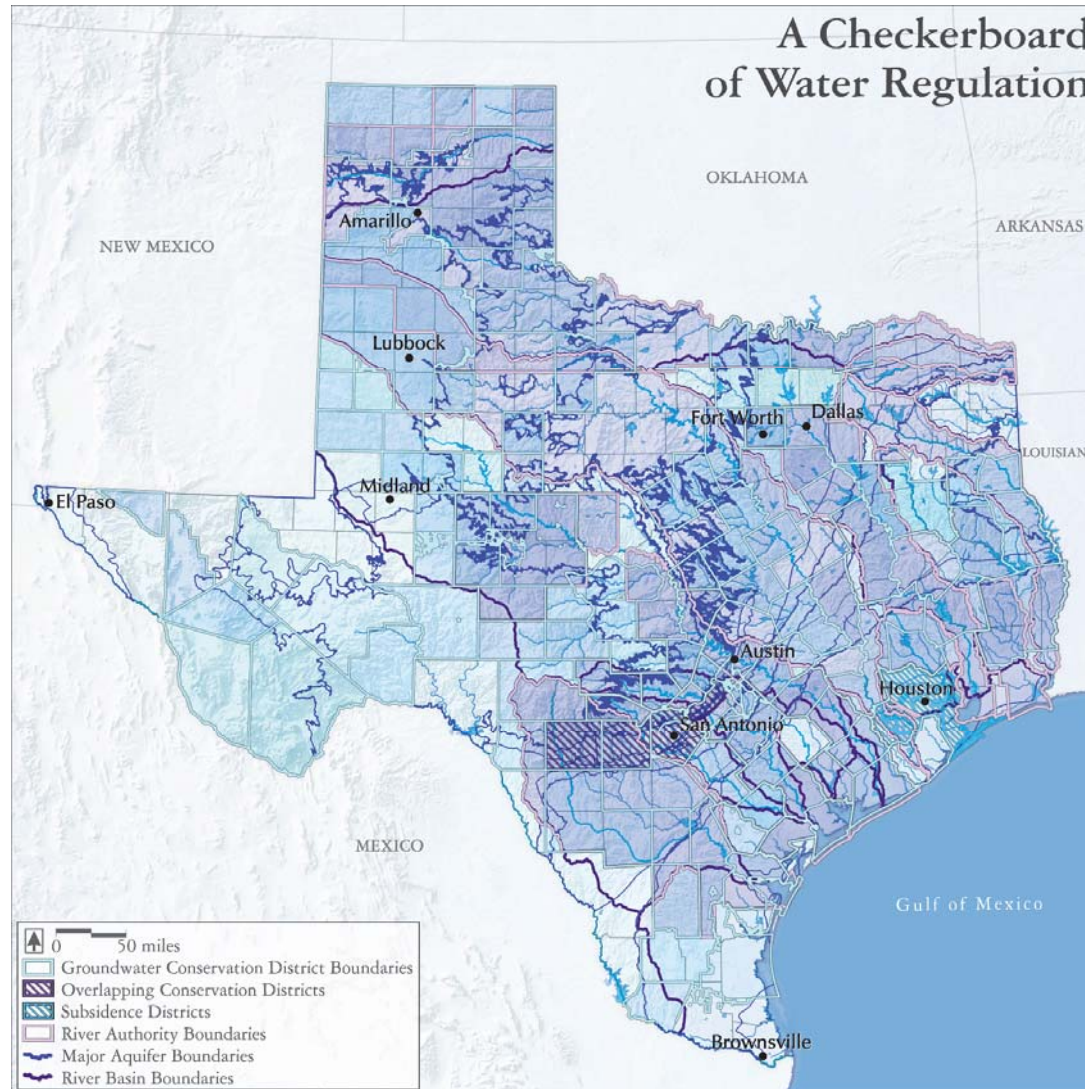
Major Watersheds



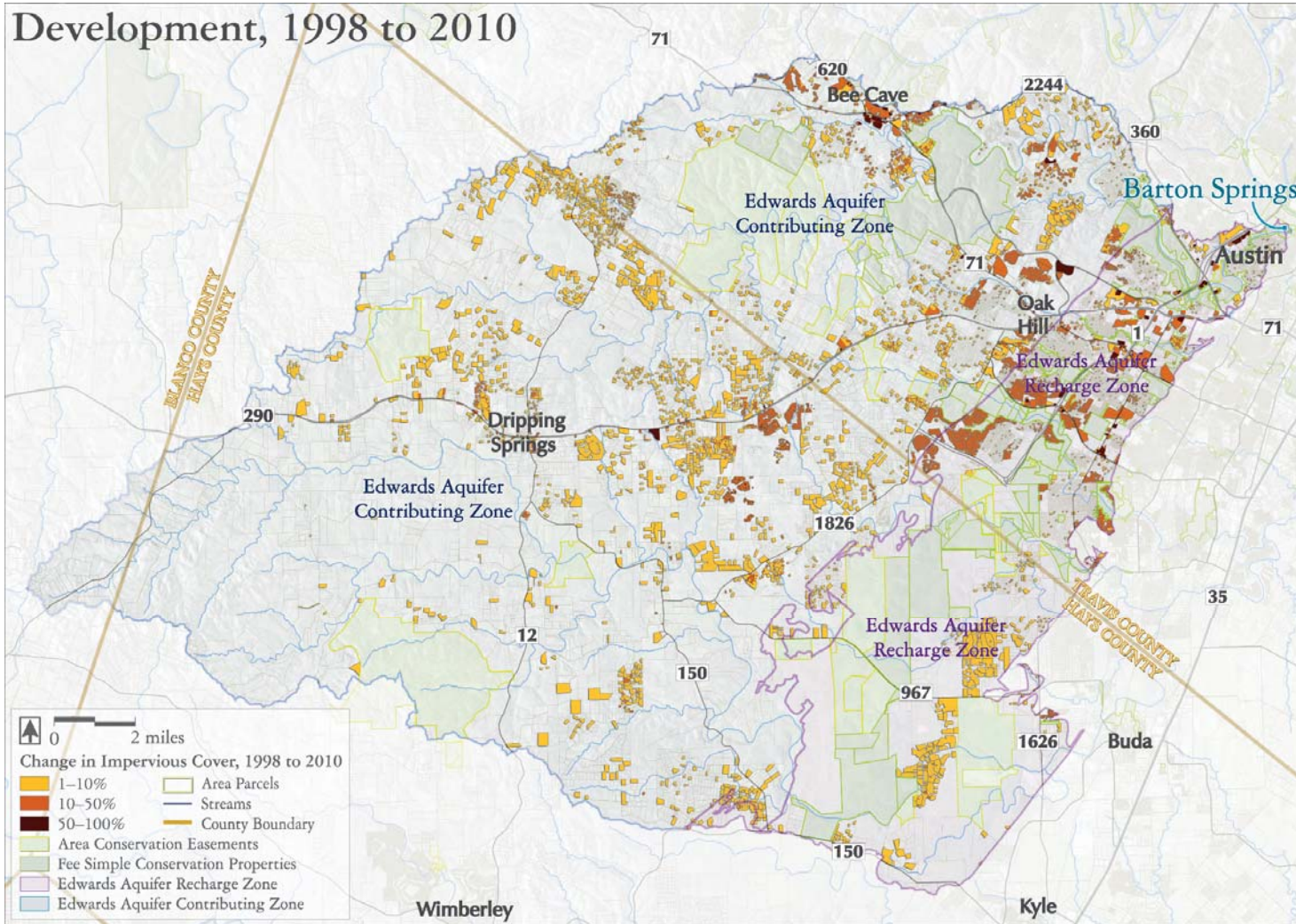
Major Texas Aquifers



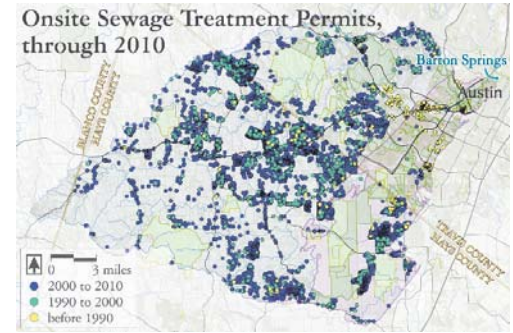
A Checkerboard of Water Regulation



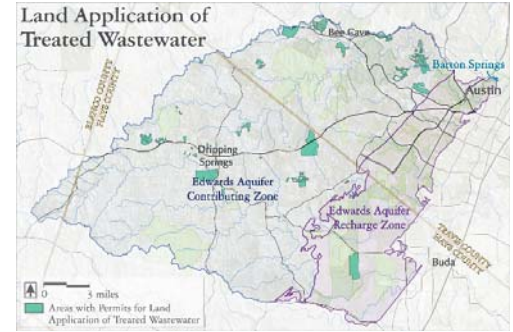

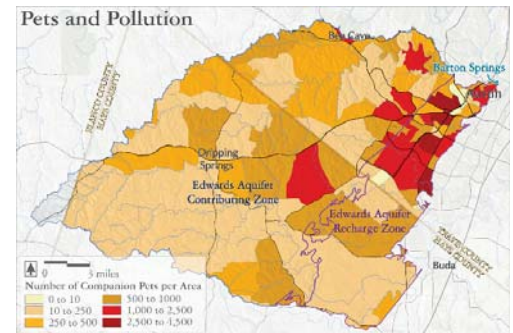
Onsite Sewage Treatment Permits, through 2010

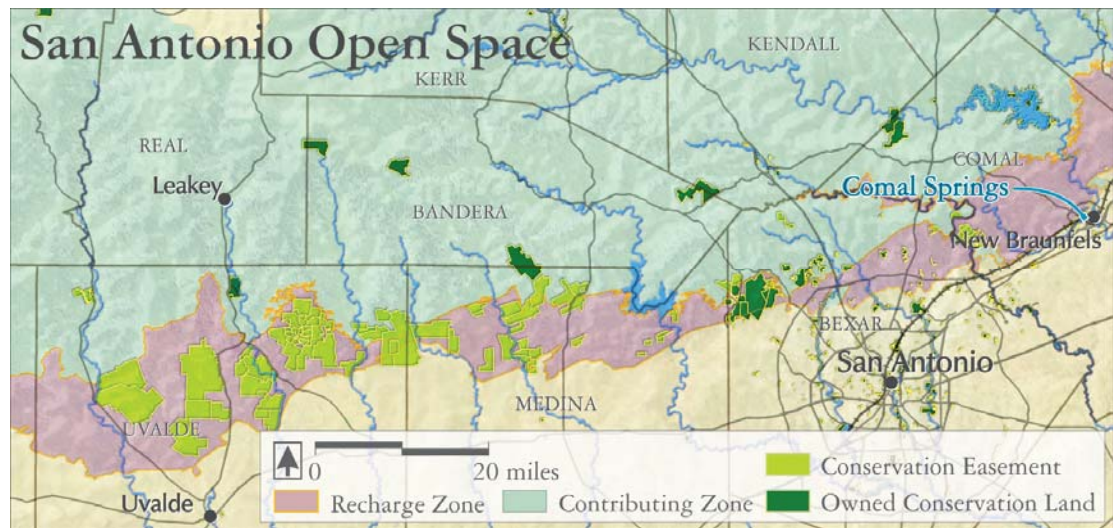
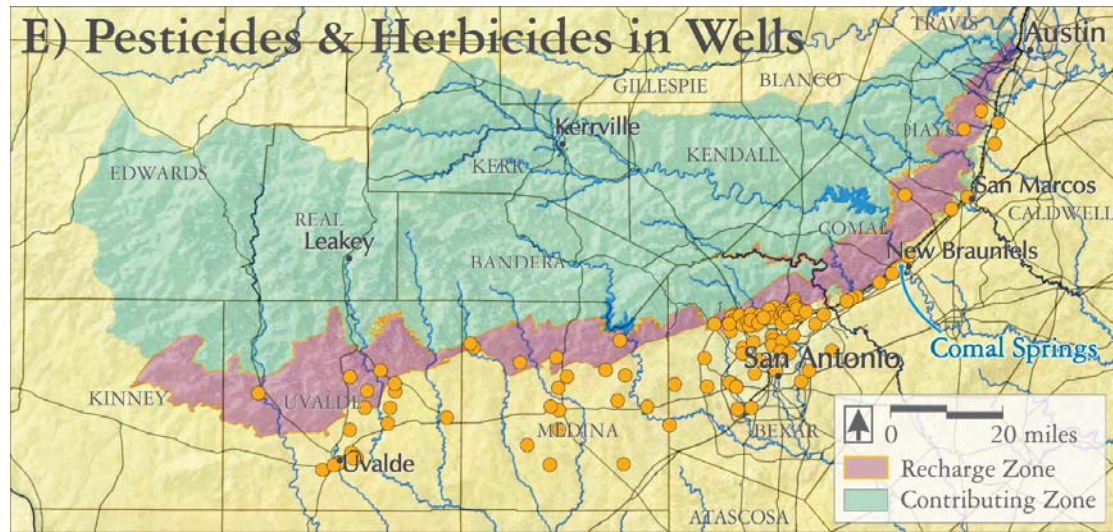


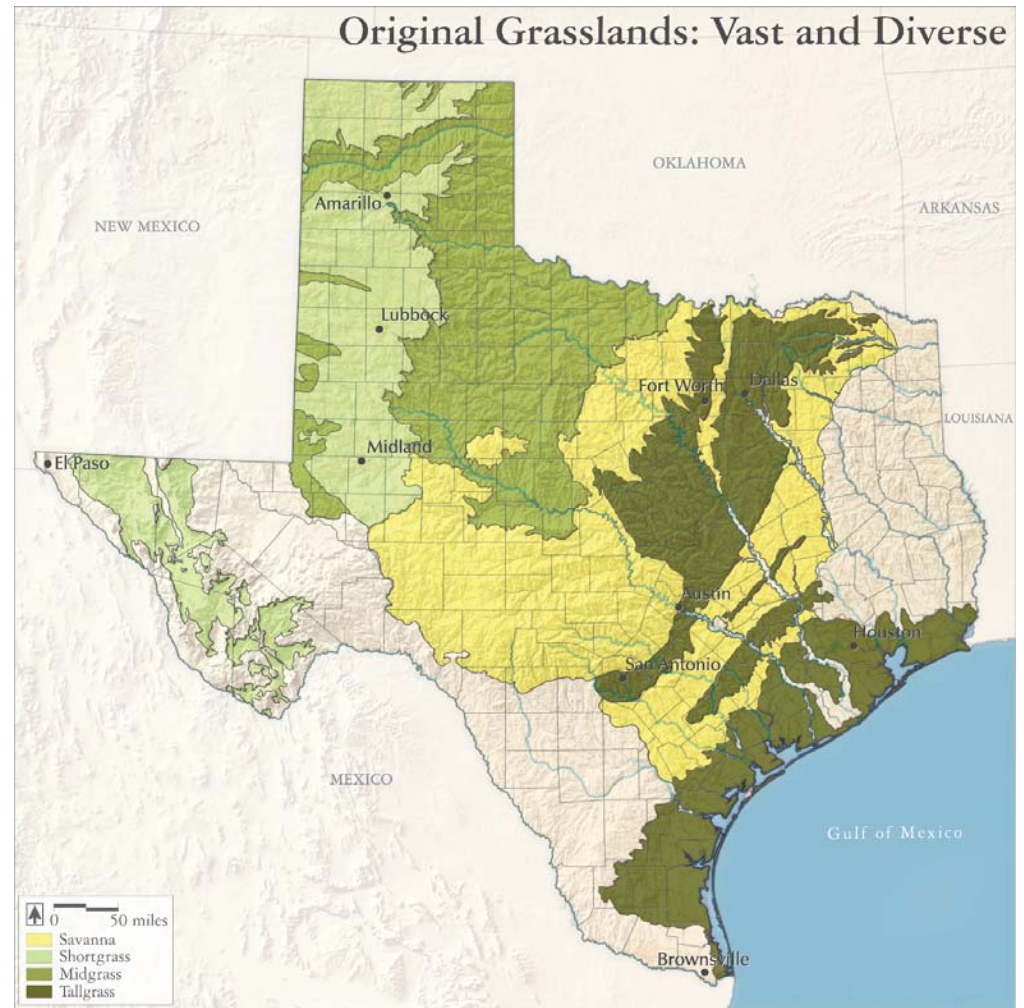
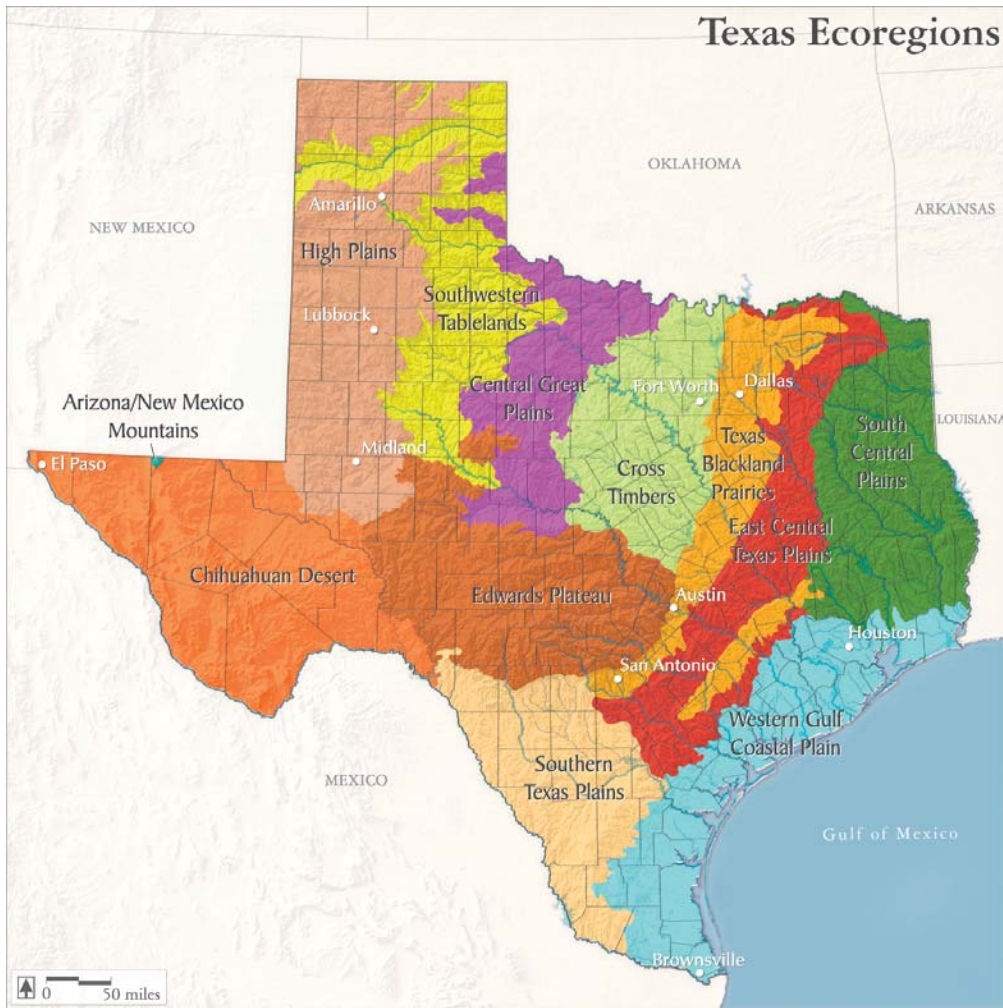

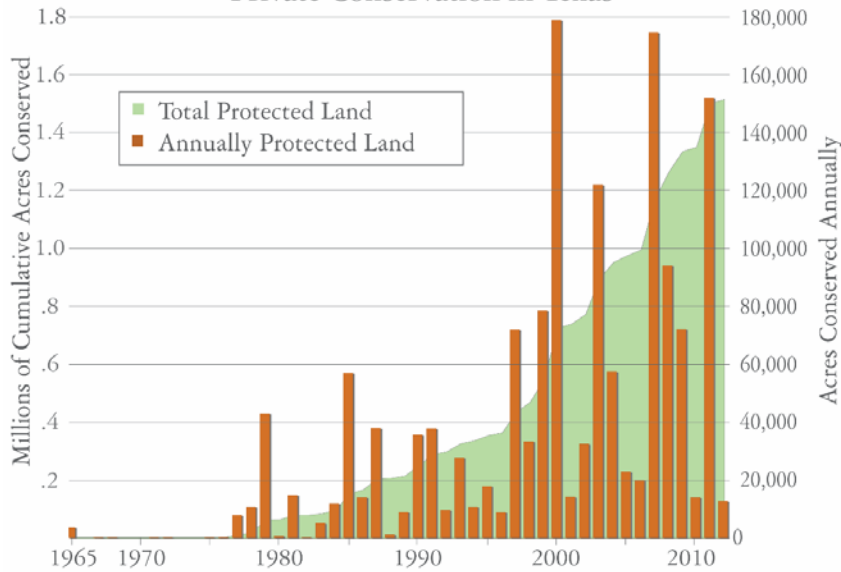




Land Protection—Federal Share, 2012

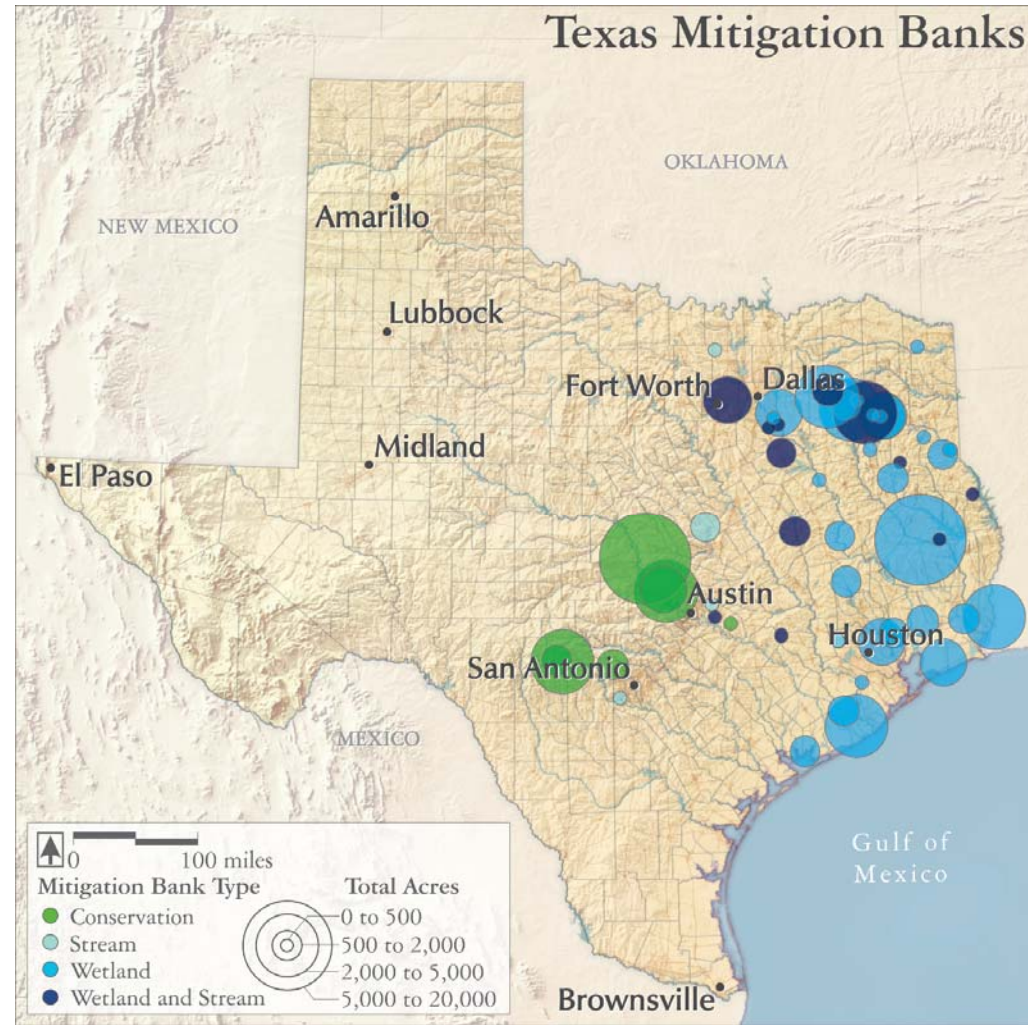
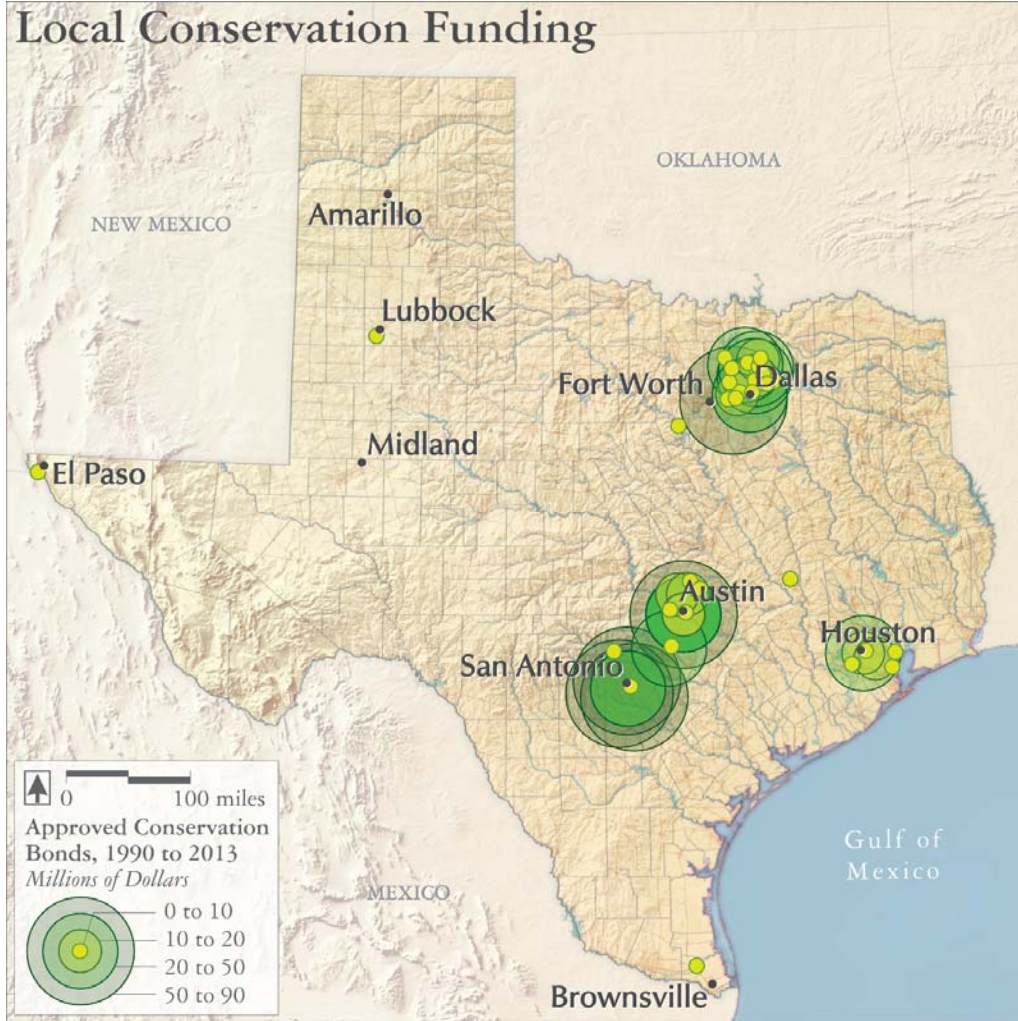

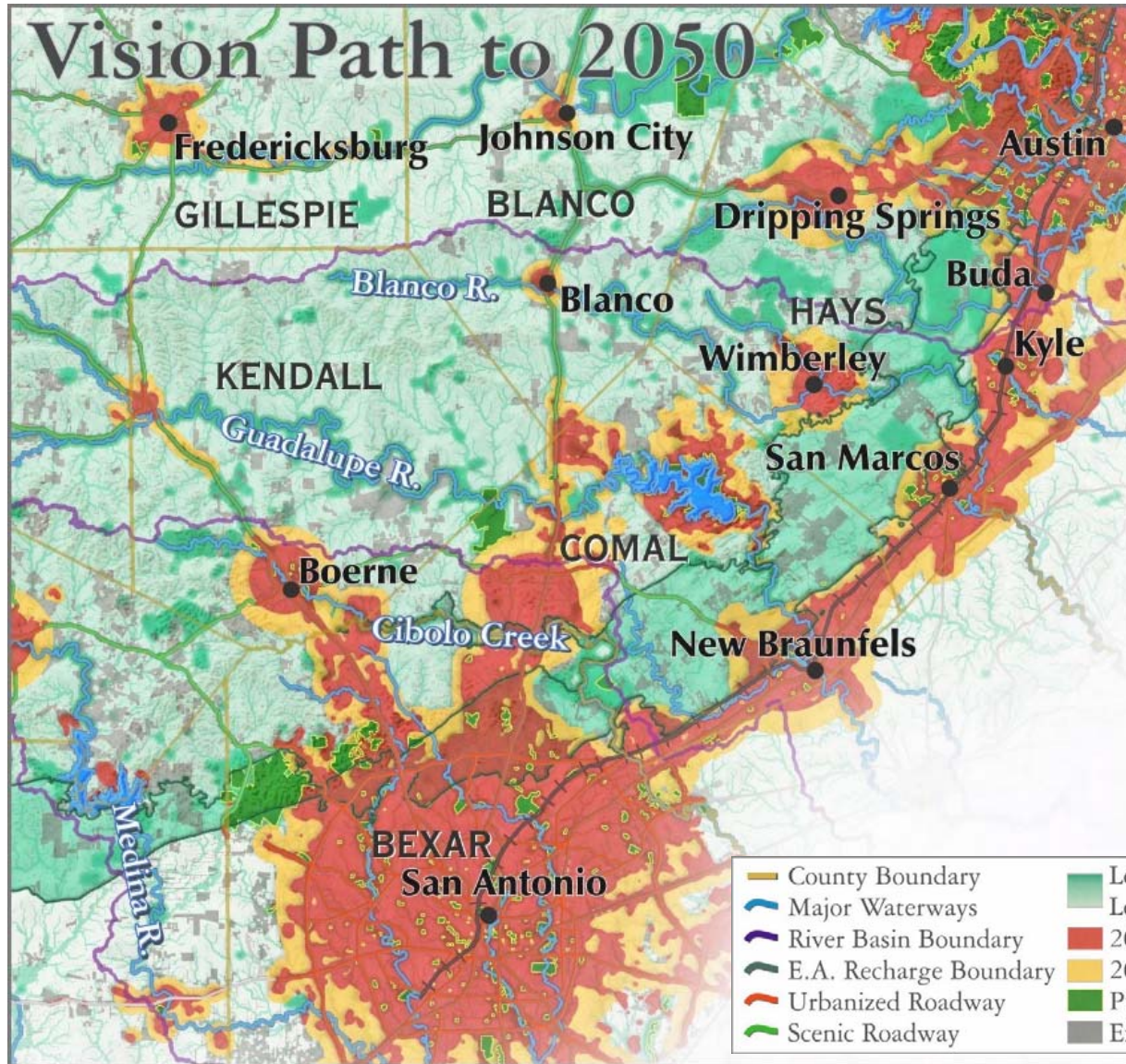




Current Path to 2050
