Hill Country Night Sky Month - Event and Activity Suggestions

This document will help you generate ideas for possible events, contests, and activities to host as part of Hill Country Night Sky Month. If you have any questions about any of the following information, email dawn@hillcountryalliance.org.

Before jumping into the list of suggestions, here are a few things to keep in mind:

- Who do you want to engage? Is there a specific age group, a particular geographic area, or a certain sector (public, business owners, government officials, etc.) with which you wish to connect?
- With whom can you partner? Are there any local institutions or organizations that already are or could become champions for the night sky? Some examples of valuable local partners might include schools, electric utilities, local parks, the chamber of commerce, prominent local businesses, the local government, the Lions or Rotary Clubs, local Keep Texas Beautiful groups, etc.
- How will you promote it? The Hill Country Alliance (HCA) will promote all shared events
 through the NightSkyMonth.org website, our HCA newsletter, and social media under
 #NightSkyMonth. What are other good ways for you to promote the event in your area?
 Check out the content in this promotional toolkit for additional resources, such as a
 sample press release.
- COVID safety. Unfortunately, we all still have to keep COVID safety in mind this year. If
 you are considering an in-person event, please ensure that social distancing will be
 possible and make sure to check in with your local government for additional guidelines
 or rules.
- Contests of many kinds. Poetry, art, photography, songwriting, and so on—with a night sky theme are good options to get the community involved. When deciding how participants can best share their submissions, weigh the pros and cons of in-person or online events.

EVENT IDEAS

Star Party

Plan an in-person or virtual tour of our night sky with an astronomer. HCA can help you identify and connect with the experts needed to offer either form of star party to your community.

Stellar Stories and Songs

Broadcast campfire stories about the myths represented in the stars or sing campfire songs about the night sky. These can be live or pre-recorded so that people can listen while looking up at the night sky from their homes. You can also invite the community to submit the stories they love. You can do this on Facebook, YouTube, or Instagram in a live or pre-recorded format. (Combine this with a story or song contest.)

Invite an Author

Invite an author to read their book or an excerpt of their story. Share it with your audience in a live or pre-recorded format. There are several books on light pollution and the night sky, written for adults and children. Contact Dawn at dawn@hillcountryalliance.org for a list of titles.

Lights Out Event

Join Texan by Nature and promote "<u>Lights Out Texas</u>" in your community. All Texans can take simple action to protect birds during peak migration (Sept 5-Oct 29) – just be sure your lighting is off or minimal. It's as easy as the flick of a switch!

Art Night

Show night-sky-themed art and have artists or others talk about what the pieces mean to them. (Combined this with an art class or contest.)

Astrophotography Class

We have many excellent astrophotographers in our region and many more people who would love to learn this rewarding craft. Work with a skilled astrophotographer to create a class inperson or online – folks can meet in the field or tune in, gear in hand, from their back yards.

Story Time for Kids

Invite kids and families to listen to a bedtime story about the night sky at your local library or online. Suggested books: "Cassandra and the Night Sky" by the Hill Country's own Amy Jackson, "There Once was a Sky Full of Stars" by Bob Crelin, "Good Night Sky: A Children's Bedtime Story" by E.M. Makins. Expert Interview or Panel Discussion

HCA can help you identify and connect with the experts needed to create an educational talk or panel for your event. Subjects could include astronomy, the impacts of light pollution on nocturnal wildlife in Texas, the value of astrotourism to our communities, or the 2024 solar eclipse coming to our region.

Make a Night Skies Presentation to City Council or Community Leaders

Present on night-sky preservation for your community's city council, school board, commissioners court, chamber of commerce, civic clubs, religious groups, or students. We can help facilitate introductions and assist you in the presentation process. If you don't feel qualified to give such a presentation, we can connect you to the right folks.

CONTEST IDEAS

You need to have a few things in place to run a successful contest, including judges, evaluation criteria, and prizes (even if they are tokens or gags). The <u>Hill Country Alliance</u> and the <u>Blanco County Friends of the Night Sky</u> have experience running contests, and we are happy to help if you need any assistance!

Night Sky Essay Contest

Invite your community (select an age group or open the competition to multiple age groups) to share their thoughts and feelings about the night sky or night sky preservation in prose. Print submissions or excerpts in the local paper, add them to your group's website or social media or recite them during a Night Sky Month event.

Night Sky Story Contest

Invite your community (select an age group or open the contest to multiple age groups) to share original stories about the night skies or the night in general. Print submissions or excerpts in the local paper, add them to your group's website or social media or recited during a Night Sky Month event.

Night Sky Art Contest

Invite your community (select an age group or open the contest to multiple age groups) to share their night-sky-themed art. Print all submissions or just winners in the local paper, add to your group's website or social media, project onto a wall downtown, or display and discuss during a Night Sky Month event.





Night Sky Photography Contest

Invite your community (select an age group or open the contest to multiple age groups) to share their nighttime photography and photography of dark-sky-friendly lighting in your community. Print submissions in the local paper, add them to your group's website or social media, project onto a wall downtown, or display and discuss during a Night Sky Month event.

Compile the contest submissions from the list above into a magazine or small book to sell or give away in the community. There are online services that can help with layout and printing. The Hill Country Alliance can point you in the right direction if this is of interest.

Night Sky Video Contest

Invite your community to share short videos about the night sky to promote night-sky-friendly lighting and night sky preservation in your community. Share submissions on the web.

Halloween Costume Contest

Invite your community to dress up to celebrate the night sky for Halloween. Adorn yourself as an astronaut, engineer, space traveler, Doctor Who, an alien, or anything that makes you want to marvel at the wonders of the universe above our heads. Share photographs and submit photos of your community wearing their costumes through social media to celebrate Hill Country Night Sky Month. Be sure to tag **#NightSkyMonth** to show off your masterpiece!

Better Lighting Contest

Invite your local community to improve their outdoor lighting and make it fun! Invite folks to share their commitment to preserving night skies by posting before and after photos on social media.

Please tag #NightSkyMonth on social media for all contests, so the Hill Country sees it!

ACTIVITY IDEAS

Citizen Science - Globe at Night

Invite your community to participate in the monthly <u>Globe at Night</u> citizen-science campaign over two weeks in October. Set a goal for the number of observations collected in your community. You can take this one step further and join the <u>Globe at Night Adopt a Street Program</u>.

Share the Stars with Kids

Check out the <u>Dark Sky Rangers</u> program, the <u>Family Sky Heroes</u> activity, and other activities for all ages from the <u>Astronomy Society of the Pacific</u>. Learn how to find constellations using <u>Uncle Al's Skywheels or Skymaps.com</u>.





Lighting Retrofit

Night Sky Month is an excellent time for lighting retrofit projects in your community. They can be high-profile locations, like a County Courthouse, school, ball field, or supermarket, or more low-key at residents' homes around town. We can help you get the word out and educate the community on how to do it and why. Big lighting projects – like stadium lighting – can take months of planning, Hill Country Night Sky Month is a great time to kick off those ventures. Try engaging a local hardware store as a partner for discounted or donated light fixtures if any are needed.

Conduct a Lighting Survey

Conduct a lighting survey at your local school or library, or downtown. Use this as a way to cheer on the usage of <u>proper night sky lighting</u> or to promote improvements to your community's existing lighting. Conduct the lighting survey yourself or let <u>Hill Country Alliance</u> put you in contact with a lighting survey specialist.

Make Your Neighborhood a "Night Sky Friendly Neighborhood"

If you live within a Home Owners Association (HOA), designate your neighborhood as Night Sky Friendly by <u>adopting this simple language</u> into your HOA agreements. <u>Visit our webpage</u> for more information about this program.

Night Sky Friendly Business Recognition Program

PROCLAMATION OF LOCAL JURISDICTION PROCLAIMING OCTOBER 2021 AS

"Hill Country Night Sky Month"

- **WHEREAS,** the aesthetic beauty and wonder of star-filled skies are the heritage of all humankind and locally to the inhabitants of local jurisdiction and are therefore worthy of celebration; and
- **WHEREAS,** the experience of standing beneath a star-filled night sky inspires feelings of wonder and awe and may encourage interest in science and nature, especially among young people; and
- **WHEREAS,** the opportunity to view star-filled skies attracts tourists to our region and therefore economic benefit to local jurisdiction; and
- **WHEREAS,** preserving the rich historical heritage and starry night skies of local jurisdiction is essential to its residents; and
- **WHEREAS,** "light pollution," light wasted performing no function or task and artificial light that goes where it is not supposed to go, is created by glare, light trespass, sky glow, and overlighting; and
- **WHEREAS,** light pollution wastes natural resources amounting to at least \$2 billion per year and contributes to diminished American energy independence; and
- **WHEREAS,** the historical view of the night skies has been eroding in many nearby areas, and generations are growing up with limited, if any, view of the wonders of the universe; and
- **WHEREAS,** the influx of people into the Texas Hill Country region and the accompanying light pollution from area lighting fixtures has been steadily on the rise; and
- **WHEREAS,** solving the problem of light pollution involves making better use of outdoor lighting to direct light down to where it is needed instead of upward into the sky, putting outdoor lights on timers and using outdoor lighting only where necessary; and
- WHEREAS, the increased dedication of Hill Country communities regarding the preservation of the region's night skies is evidenced by the frequent educational activities conducted in our region and by the increasing number of places in our region recognized as International Dark-Sky Places by the International Dark-Sky Association, including: Enchanted Rock State Natural Area, South Llano State Park, the LBJ National Historical Park, the City of Dripping Springs, the Wimberley Valley, the City of Fredericksburg, the City of Horseshoe Bay, U Bar U Camp & Retreat Center, River Hills Neighborhood of Travis County, and Lost Creek Neighborhood of Travis County; and
- WHEREAS, [Add names of local night sky partners here] and the Hill Country Alliance have devoted many hours in local jurisdiction to share the wonder of our night skies, and promote responsible lighting to help us see better at night; and
- **WHEREAS,** this regional effort and the preservation and celebration of our night skies are worth a month-long celebration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED by the local jurisdiction, Texas:

- 1. That October 2021 shall hereafter be known as "Hill Country Night Sky Month" in local jurisdiction, Texas.
- **2.** That the local elected body encourages citizens to enjoy the night sky and to participate in the local jurisdiction's and the Hill Country region's events and programs celebrating the night sky and promoting the ways in which communities are working to preserve it.
- **3.** That the local elected body encourages citizens to learn about light pollution and why it matters, night sky friendly lighting, and lighting regulations, and to implement practices and lighting improvements that will reduce light pollution, thereby preserving our night skies.
- **4.** That the local clerk is hereby instructed to post this Proclamation at local public display location for Public Display and enter this document into the permanent records of the local jurisdiction.





Hill Country Night Sky Month – Social Media Guide

SOCIAL MEDIA

What is social media?

The "social" part: it's direct interaction, person to person. The "media" part means both the "instrument" AND "news source." Put them together: Web-based communication tools to both share and CONSUME information. Social "Networking" is a part: it's who your audience is and how you interact with them (friends, colleagues, other friend groups, etc.)

Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter are likely to have the most significant impact. If you do not have all these accounts, do not worry – use what you have! If you have Facebook and Instagram, linking them together will save you from creating separate posts to each platform – for more on this, see page 3.

Tagging and Social Media

NOTE: PLEASE ensure all postings (pictures/text) are appropriate and what you want to reflect to the rest of the world and the Hill Country Alliance.

When you post, be sure to tag #nightskymonth so readers can find everything in one place!

What is tagging?

Tagging allows users to identify someone else in a post, photo, tweet, or status update. This tag takes the form of a clickable name or username that will notify a person that you have referred to them in a post or photo. Tagging uses # or @ before the 'handle' or identifier of the tagged person or group.

Hashtagging (or tagging with a #) is most effective on Twitter and Instagram but not typically used on Facebook. Tagging with an @ is used to reference and bring up an existing page or account and notify the account's owner.

For example, #nightskymonth indicates a threaded discussion on a TOPIC, while @hillcountryalliance is a directed message toward a specific PERSON or ENTITY – in this case, the HCA Instagram or Facebook page.

How do I link or unlink my Instagram account to my Facebook profile?

Linking an account

To link your Instagram and Facebook accounts and share posts directly from Instagram to Facebook:

Step 1: Go to your Instagram profile and tap = .

Step 2: Tap Settings.

Step 3: Tap Account, then tap Sharing to Other Apps

Step 4: Tap Facebook and enter your Facebook login info.

Once you link accounts, you'll have the option to share a post to Facebook from the same screen where you add a caption. You can also share from Instagram to a Facebook Page you manage.

Unlink your account

To unlink your Facebook account:

Step 1: Go to your profile and tap = .

Step 2: Tap Settings.

Step 3: Tap Account, then tap Linked Accounts.

Step 4: Tap Facebook, and then tap Unlink Account (iPhone) or Unlink (Android).

Step 5: Tap Yes, Unlink to confirm.

Input details in the yellow highlighted areas as they correspond to your event or activity, and remove highlighting once complete.

This template is to help you publicize your function clearly and easily. Should you already have alternative methods of contacting the media, please feel free to refer to those methods and use these templates only as needed.

Send out the Media Advisory before an event occurrence. List all of your events at one time, or distribute a single form for each function.

PRESS RELEASE

The Press Release Template is an open-fill document for your use in communicating to the press details following the completion of your event/s. There is an area in the upper right-hand corner of the header where you can attach your organization's logo. In the footer, you will see highlighted text indicating where to denote your specific contact information. Input details in the yellow highlighted areas as they corresponded to your event or activity, and remove highlighting once complete.

This template is to help you spotlight the success of your function clearly and easily. Should you already have alternative methods of contacting the media, please feel free to refer to those methods and use these templates only as needed.

Send out the Press Release following your event/s. It can be a summation of all events held during Hill Country Night Sky Month or distribute a Press Release for each function.
